15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary					

Seethalakshmi Ramaswami College offers diverse multi-disciplinary and interdisciplinary courses in Undergraduate and Postgraduate programmes, including Cross-Disciplinary, Value-Added, Certificate, and Non-Major Elective Courses which are holistic in nature that caters to evolve academic and societal needs. Five Cross-Disciplinary courses are being offered to twelve department students which enhance interdisciplinary critical thinking. Two Non-Major Elective Courses at the Undergraduate level and one at the Postgraduate level also provides an opportunity for the students to acquire diversified skill sets. The integration of traditional and contemporary knowledge systems ensures a broad, dynamic learning experience, equipping students with versatile skills and fostering critical thinking to excel in a rapidly changing world. Bridge Course conducted by the department of English connects the students of different departments to strengthen their language skills. Various competitions and exhibitions organized by the departments embrace the multidisciplinary learning experience. Cultural programmes organized by the college students union and Muthamizh vizha organized by the department of Tamil bring out the diversified skills of students. In collaboration with Bharath Gyan, Chennai, the Department of Sanskrit, and the Centre for Ethics & Human Values successfully completed four online Credit Courses on Indian Civilizational Studies offered by the Hindu University of America, Orlando, Florida. These courses foster interdisciplinary learning and broaden students' perspectives. These initiatives encourage students to engage in diverse disciplines, broaden their perspectives and equip them with knowledge that integrates traditional wisdom and modern education.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The College implemented the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) during the Academic Year 2003-2004, followed by the introduction of the Common Choice Based Credit System (CCBCS) in 2008-2009. Students are encouraged to enroll in Online Courses with credits offered by SWAYAM, NPTEL, and MOOC. The college is currently considering the implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits in accordance with the National Education Policy of 2020.

17. Skill development:

The institution is dedicated to enhance the skills of students in order to make their education truly purposeful. Skill-based electives, Certificate courses, and Value-added courses for Undergraduate and Postgraduate students are integrated into the curriculum to enrich domain skills. Introduction of real-time group project in the Undergraduate curriculum has enhanced the students'

skills to match the industrial needs. The institution offers a 90 hours course on 'Basic Computer Concepts and Internet Courses' and a 3 year Diploma in Information Technology by associating with InfoSchool, Trichy to provide foundational computer skills and internet literacy aiming to bridge the digital divide, ensuring that students from all backgrounds are equipped with essential tools to succeed in this digital era. A 100-hour certificate programme in Banking, Finance and Insurance is offered in collaboration with Bajaj Finserv Ltd, Trichy which developed the relevant domain skills to the students. Employability skills are a key focus of the short-term professional placement training program offered to final year students, where the students get exposed to group discussions, mock interviews and aptitude tests to meet the global demands. Students have the opportunity to participate in activities such as yoga, silambam, and taekwondo to enhance their life skills. Furthermore, communicative skills are strengthened through courses and training sessions such as spoken Sanskrit, spoken Hindi, language labs, and curated workshops. Various workshops organized by department associations, the Students' Union, centre and clubs focussing on enhancing life skills, professional skills, and social skills. NET/SET coaching and various competitive examination readiness training are being continuously offered to the students and plethora of exhibitions and student's competitions are also conducted regularly to broaden their knowledge horizon. Overall, the institution is committed to provide a holistic education that prepares students for success in their chosen fields and beyond.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The departments of Hindi, Sanskrit, and Tamil of our institution offer courses that embrace Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS). These courses help in the development of holistic, comprehensive learning environment that prepare students to navigate through complexities of the modern world. In addition to academic courses, the departments also organize lectures and exhibitions to create awareness among students. The Department of Music provides courses on traditional music both in English and Tamil mediums and hosts various programs and competitions to enhance students' skills in traditional music. Furthermore, the departments of Commerce, Economics, and History have incorporated cultural aspects and IKS into their curriculum. The Department of Sanskrit and the Centre for Ethics & Human Values regularly organise lectures on topics related to IKS. A collaborative effort between Bharath Gyan, Chennai and the Department of Sanskrit with the Centre for Ethics & Human Values of Seethalakshmi Ramaswami College, Tiruchirappalli,

successfully completed four online Credit Courses on Indian Civilizational Studies offered by the Hindu University of America, Orlando, Florida.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome Based Education curriculum is followed this year. The Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes are designed in alignment with the proposed vision and mission of the college. OBE is incorporated with well-planned outcomes, considering the skill sets of the students and the knowledge they acquire at the completion of the course and programme of study. To ensure the successful implementation of OBE, workshops and training programmes were organized in collaboration with parent University and other HEI's. OBE curriculum is approved by the Board of Studies and Academic Council. The revision of syllabus is carried out based on the reviews and recommendations suggested by the university nominee, subject expert, students, parents and alumni. Several meetings are conducted to evolve the strategies for flawless implementation of OBE and outcomes were displayed in the college website to make the learners aware of the learning process. Student orientation programmes are convened on schedule to update them with the changes implemented in the curriculum. The controller of Examinations carries forward the implemented revision in the framework and instructs question paper setters to follow the latest changes. Teaching-learning methods and evaluation processes are carefully crafted to align with the OBE framework.

20.Distance education/online education:

The institution is now offering courses through offline mode and it aspires to offer online courses to meet the future demands. To promote online education, students are guided to enroll courses offered by SWAYAM, NPTEL and MOOC platforms. A 100-hour Online certificate programme in Banking, Finance and Insurance is offered in collaboration with Bajaj Finserv Ltd, Trichy which developed the relevant domain skills to the students. A collaborative effort between Bharath Gyan, Chennai and the Department of Sanskrit with the Centre for Ethics & Human Values successfully completed four online Credit Courses on Indian Civilizational Studies offered by the Hindu University of America, Orlando, Florida. The courses included are Hindu Contributions in the Realm of Part A-Big 5 (HSF1201-SUMMER 2023), Hindu Contributions to the World in the Realm of Matter - Game Changer (HSF1202-FALL 2023), Hindu Contributions in the Realm of Mind - Sciences and Arts (HSF1203-WINTER 2024) and Hindu Contributions to the World in the Realm of Mind - Living and Lifestyle (HSF1204-SPRING 2024).

Seethalakshmi Ramaswami College (Autonomous), affiliated to Bharathidasan University, has been a beacon of women's education since its inception in 1951. The institution offers 24 Undergraduate, 11 Postgraduate, and 8 Ph.D. programmes, ensuring quality higher education that empowers women. By adopting Outcome-Based Education (OBE), the curriculum integrates Programme Outcomes, Programme-Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes across its Core, Allied, Value-Added and Certificate courses, Skill Based and Major	

Based Elective courses. This approach fosters domain knowledge, employability skills, life skills, and interpersonal skills.

The curriculum emphasizes practical learning through projects and incorporates foundational courses like Gender Studies, Soft skill development, Environmental Studies and Value-Based Education in undergraduate programmes to encourage multidisciplinary understanding. Regular updates to the curriculum, informed by feedback from stakeholders, and recommendations from the Academic Council and Board of Studies members, ensure alignment with local, national, and global needs.

The college blends traditional and modern teaching methodologies, supplemented by enriching activities such as conferences, seminars, workshops, field visits, and outreach initiatives. Functional MoUs and compulsory computer training programmes further equip students with the skills needed for employment and entrepreneurship. The College remains committed to enhance quality education, empowering women to thrive in their chosen fields, and making meaningful contributions to society.

Environmental Studies builds awareness about climate change, natural disasters, pollution, and global warming, encouraging environmental stewardship. Value-Based Education imparts knowledge about ethics, values, and principles for peaceful coexistence. Gender Studies develops sensitivity toward women's roles in nation-building, while Soft Skill Development enhances employability and professional ethics by focusing on interpersonal, communication, and emotional intelligence skills. With 270 core and supporting courses, the curriculum reflects advancements in Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values, and Professional Ethics. Department associations actively contribute to students' development by organizing women empowerment programmes, entrepreneurial awareness sessions, Swachh Bharat initiatives, and extension activities in adopted villages. Value-added courses and certificate programmes offered across departments address contemporary societal challenges, equipping students with critical skills for dynamic roles. These initiatives aim to foster critical thinking, environmental and social responsibility, and holistic development. By addressing modern societal needs, the college prepares students to navigate challenges effectively and contribute meaningfully to society.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

The college caters primarily to rural students and first-generation learners. In a heterogeneous classroom atmosphere, for assessing the learning levels regular tests, quizzes, assignments, seminars, class participation, and oral tests are adopted. Based on the results of the tests, the institution identifies slow learners and advanced learners.

Advanced learners are inspired to take up leadership roles, such as office bearer positions in the student council, to provide them with

opportunities for practical learning. They are assigned with solving questions that demand high order thinking skills (HOTS) to enhance their analytical skills, such as designing models and formulate patterns. They are encouraged to participate in seminars and conferences, present papers and publish articles to develop their critical acumen. The meritorious students are motivated to appear for university rank exams and every year a handful of students bag the top ranks who are appreciated with prizes and awards during college day celebrations.

For slow learners' remedial classes are conducted after the college hours. They are given simplified notes to aid their exam preparation. Mentors strengthen them through counselling sessions and help them keep focused on their academics. Group tasks, combined study, peer learning and buddy programmes promote efficiency of the slow learners.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

Catering to the needs of the myriad learners and for personalized teaching, a teacher adopts innovative teaching techniques. These methodologies include experiential, participative and problem-solving methodologies. In experiential learning, students learn through first-hand experience. Learners take up internship programmes, undertake field work, involve in social service, develop

products, review books, organise exhibitions, interview great personalities and learn marketing strategies through Entrepreneurial Developmental Cell activities.

Participative learning motivates the learners to participate in the act of learning. Students prepare innovative projects, manage events and celebrations, organise seminars and conferences, engage in peer-teaching and learning, analyse case-study questions, participate in group discussions and debates, create and edit videos, make motion pictures and design programmes.

Problem solving methodologies sharpen the functional skills. Students are exposed to the real-time problems relating to the subject of study. After identifying the issues, they troubleshoot and implement the solutions based on their analysis. For example, Nutrition and Dietetics department prepares nutritious diet chart as a supplement for the malnourished. Music students render songs with healing effect to the inmates of the old age homes, Computer literates examine and trouble shoot programmes for the desired output.

These techniques chisel the learners to be ready for all the challenges.

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT-enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning

ICT tools are extensively used to develop the academic ability of the students. In Google Classrooms, teachers post class materials, assignment topics and use other Google workspace tools such as docs and forms enabling the students to access material, submit assignments and be guided virtually. The students collaborate with one another by preparing quizzes, games and videos. They are encouraged to utilize digital repositories such as N-List, and NDL for accessing e-resources, databases and other academic materials. By enrolling in MOOCs and NPTEL courses, they enhance their academic calibre and career prospects.

Students are motivated to perform experiments through virtual labs. MATLAB allows the learners to carry out complex data analysis, algorithms and data matrices. To meet the unique needs and pace of each learner with different learning abilities, teachers prepare educational videos. These are posted on the institution's YouTube channel thereby providing additional support and resources. This helps learners gradually achieve independence in learning.

Webinars and conferences conducted online, facilitate exposure and widen knowledge as the students and the teachers get an opportunity to listen to and interact with experts transcending regional boundaries. Employment of flipped and blended teaching and Open Educational Resources provide a holistic learning environment.

2.3.4 - Preparation and adherence to Academic Calendar and Teaching Plans by the institution

At the commencement of each academic year, the Academic Calendar is prepared by the Calendar Committee with the guidance of the Principal, Dean, Internal Quality Assurance Cell and administrative heads. It is developed in strict adherence to the guidelines established by the University Grants Commission and affiliated university ensuring full compliance with statutory bodies. Prior to

the commencement of the academic year, departmental heads allocate subjects to faculty who prepare the teaching plan.

The calendar provides comprehensive information, including the total number of working days per semester, national, religious holidays, parents' meetings, alumnae reunions, and the commemoration days. It marks the period of CIA, pre-semester examinations and end-semester examinations. Soft copy is published on the website and the printed copies are distributed to students and faculty in June to ensure broad dissemination.

Faculty are required to formulate detailed teaching plans, outlining the methodology and timeline. They are expected to divide the portion considering the cycle tests and pre semester examination. They include the dates of the oral test, slip test and discussion of the difficult areas. The progress of the curriculum, students' comprehension and the expected outcome are monitored.

This structured approach ensures the efficient execution of the academic year.

Every academic year begins with orientation sessions and foundation courses which provide an understanding of the OBE frameworks. Seethalakshmi Ramaswami College strives for excellence in academic research by modernizing facilities and implementing policies such as the research promotion policy, code of ethics and plagiarism check policy. There are eight acknowledged research centres and a central instrumentation facility (CIF) that allow researchers and students

to conduct socially relevant innovative research. In order to encourage faculty to generate patents, conduct research, publish articles and create laboratory manuals and textbooks, seed money for an amount of Rs.3.75 lakhs were provided. SRC QUEST, the college journal, offers a platform for publishing research of contemporary significance. Students library have access to e-resources of the state-of-the-art laboratory and software support. Students are motivated to submit and distribute their own original papers as an outcome of their projects. Plagiarism is monitored using software. The college library has 76303 books, 630 journals, including back volumes and access to 250872 e-books and 6529 e-journals via N-List to enhance study. Students undertake summer projects at renowned research institutions like IIT, IISc, BARC, CLRI, IIA and IGCAR. The commitment of the IPR Cell in promoting research is demonstrated by four granted patents, eight published patents and one patent applied recently.

6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

The college employs several strategies to mobilize funds effectively. It seeks and receives grants from non-government sources to support educational services and collects government-specified fees from both aided and self-financing sections, ensuring compliance with regulatory norms. These fees primarily cover academic expenses. The management contributes Rs. 40 to 45 lakhs annually to support ongoing maintenance and operational costs, demonstrating a commitment to the institution's sustainability. Faculty members are encouraged to engage in consultancy, corporate training services, and collaborative projects, generating additional funds. The college conducted 30 corporate training sessions, generating Rs. 6.16 lakhs, and organized 9 international conferences and workshops to promote academic collaboration. Besides, the college has received Rs. 19,83,000 from individuals and philanthropists to effectively use it for educational needs. Departments like Botany, Chemistry, Tamil, and Zoology have

organized international FDPs, fostering academic networks. These funding sources are crucial for managing academic and operational needs. SRC has implemented various mechanisms to manage degradable & non-degradable waste. Solid waste is segregated. Kitchen waste is used for generating biogas. Dry leaves are collected and processed for producing vermicompost. Paper waste has been considerably reduced after having implemented paperless office. Yet the paper waste that is minimally generated is carefully processed and recycled into stationery materials and house-hold articles for daily use and decor purposes.

The plastic waste and e-waste generated in the campus are collected and given to an external agency for reuse and recycle. SRC has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with an external agency for careful and responsible disposal of waste.

The waste water that is collected in the waste water collection tanks is purified and diverted to the gardens across the campus.

Rainwater is harvested through the numerous rainwater harvesting pits & bunds, that are built across the campus. Water percolation pathways are laid all over the campus, to support rainwater seepage which will directly increase the ground water level, contributing to water sustainability on campus.

Biomedical waste is segregated and collected in designated colour coded bins. Infectious waste are pre-treated before final disposal. Several disposal bins for solid and chemical waste, filter paper, broken glass are kept at vantage points to ensure the proper disposal of waste.
